#### Chairman's Report

It is excellent news that Robyn Smith has been appointed as the Assistant Curator in charge of Otari and will take up her new position on 1 September 2003. The desirability of having Robyn recruited to the Otari staff has been mooted for some time and it is a great pleasure that this has come about. The skills Robyn has, particularly those gained in the Percy Scenic Reserve nurturing the Tony Druce collection, will be valuable in Otari-Wilton's Bush.

Unfortunately, there has been less success in appointing a replacement for Tony Williams as the Curator of the Botanic Gardens and that position has had to be readvertised. Both Tony Williams and Jane Wright are sorely missed. The corporate memory of the improvements needed for Otari and their enthusiasm for change to lift the national profile of the reserve appear to have gone with them. This was brought home to the Board in the Wellington City Council response to the Board's submission on the Annual Plan this year.

The Board made a forthright submission on the Annual Plan repeating, in part, the submissions of the previous year, recommending adequate funding and staffing to implement the 1996 management plan, seeking greater transparency in the funding allocation to the reserve, and suggesting that these aims might be best achieved by making Otari a stand-alone unit, separate from the other units of the Botanic Gardens. Unfortunately, the council viewed these as unappreciated criticisms of the administration and there has been no major change within the Annual Plan for the operating expenses of the reserve. However, subsequent discussions with council staff have been beneficial and two projects that the Board has viewed as urgent will proceed soon.

It is a pleasure, too, to see the structural work of the Wilton Walkway completed. This is an excellent complement to the Canopy Walkway and will be enjoyed by everyone coming to the reserve, but especially by those limited to relatively level walkways.

Unfortunately we were not successful in obtaining a grant from WCC to print a souvenir bookmark but plan to proceed with this project hopefully with support from a sponsor.

#### Land and Boundaries (convenor Athol Swann)

On a fine Thursday late July, guided by Chris Horne and Barbara Mitcalfe, Bill Winstanley and I viewed the western and southern boundaries of Otari-Wilton's Bush from the hilltop. Our tramp commenced from the sub-station directly up the hill to the Otari peak and south along the skyline to Johnson's Hill, then down through the bush track to join the Blue Trail back to the Information Centre some 5 hours later. The views from the hilltop vantage points were breathtaking emphasising the diversity of scenery available to Wellingtonians only a short distance from the city centre. The properties adjacent to the presently designated Otari-Wilton Wilton's Bush Reserve particularly on the southern boundary extending to the Karori cemetery have well established native forest coverage. We envisage that this area together with the land to the east of the Kaiwharawhara stream to Wilton Rd, which is currently owned by the city, should ultimately be classified as Scenic Reserve and become part of Otari-Wilton's Bush Reserve for appropriate management. (Note:- For those contemplating the skyline walk we traversed as above, you require prior approval to cross the farmland )

#### Community Planning Pilot for Wadestown /Wilton

The Trust has been participating in the forum meetings developing a vision for the Highland Park, Wadestown and Wilton suburban area. These discussions have focused on - Where we are now? and Where we want to be? in relation to the Natural & Built Environment and the Social & EconomicEnvironment. The responses developed from those attending are being summarised and it is expected that when this is completed, they will be communicated to the wider community to gain overall acceptance/support.

Otari - Wilton's Bush is a significant feature of this suburban community being reviewed, and the Trust's vision for the Reserve, providing better Information Centre facilities (shop/café) and including an Education Centre as well as appropriate bus linkages to the City center via the Botanic Gardens for tourist visitors, fits well within the scope of the Community Plan expected to be developed. Input from our members to this forum is welcome and the next meeting is scheduled for Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> September 7.30 pm at the Wadestown Community Centre.

There is plenty of tui and wood pigeon about and four paradise ducks are visiting at the moment too.

The Kaiwharawhara revegetation project is progressing well with planting for this year completed so thank you to all concerned and keep an eye on the notice board for upcoming plant maintenance weekends.


Otari staff were involved in a days planting with Tawa volunteers at several sites at Redwood and one at Greenarces and along with Thursday morning volunteers have been assisting WWF school group revege plantings on the north picnic lawn. The North picnic lawn is now really taking shape (literally) with the revege plantings over the last few seasons establishing and the lawn area taking on a more enclosed and inviting look.

The Wilton Walkway is now complete and open for use, there is still some work to do in the Dracophyllum garden e.g. redistributing soil, adding compost, planting and some interpretation to organise before its all completed but this should not be too far off. The first stage of the circular walk upgrade is also finished with some new surfacing and safety railing installed.

Well that's about it....hope to see you all at the plant sale on Sunday 14 September at 9.30am.

#### Sophora microphylla

(Kowhai) New Zealand's largest species of kowhai, S. microphylla is found in most parts of the country. In cultivation it can reach 10m, a large tree for most gardens. It likes a well drained soil. It produces prolific yellow flowers in spring which attract birds, particularly tui. The bark had various medicinal uses for Maori, applied externally for itches and skin diseases, and taken internally as a tonic. It was also said to help healing fractures, and to reduce bruising.

Some of the kowhai at Otari are flowering early, possibly because we have had a fine, mild winter.

## **REVEGETATION PROJECT**

This has been the main focus of the winter, as Bronwen Wall and Jonathan Kennett have led parties of volunteers into Herculean labours, ably assisted by Mary Nawalowalo, who recruited and coordinated for the project, and, of course, the Otari staff who persuaded the plants to grow in the first place (with the weekday volunteers).

#### **Fast Forests**

In an informal interview Bronwen Wall and Jonathan Kennett discuss the Trust's Kaiwharawhara Stream Revegetation Project.

BW: Well JK, we've reached the end of the 2003 planting season, how do you feel it went?

JK: Absolutely fantastic BW. No doubt about it. Hundreds of volunteers have planted over 7,000 trees. Every site prepared by Greater Wellington Regional Council earlier this year is now jam-packed and ready to grow.

BW: It was a phenomenal effort, wasn't it? I mean, some weekends we had 30-odd people helping out, and then there were the Mormons.

JK: 150 of them to be precise - all in the same valley at the same time - it was mind boggling.

BW: But we couldn't have done it without them. They planted 1,500 trees in two days!

JK: Yep, they were a Godsend; at least that's what they told me.

BW: And don't forget Otari School coming down to plant on Arbor Day. That was a hoot in itself.

JK: By crikey, they were keen. With the ever-ready Otari Staff and stalwart Thursday volunteers helping supervise, they planted most of site 9 in a morning.

BW: Yup, those kids were keen alright. Proves the old adage 'enthusiasm is beauty'.

JK: Who said that? Elizabeth Arden?

BW: Ah no... it was Blake, JK. You know, William Blake, the Poet?... But anyway, things don't end quite yet, do they? JK: No way! If we just abandoned the plants now, half of them would be pushing up blackberry in a year's time. That's why we have Plant Care sessions on the second Saturday of the month, meeting 9a.m. on the deck. BW & JK: See you there!

Bronwen Wall handed the seedling to Margaret.
