Annual General Meeting: Chairman's Report

At our Annual General Meeting on 15th May we had nine nominees to fill the eight positions decided by the outgoing Board as an appropriate level. A duly proposed resolution from the members present, decided that rather than conduct a ballot, the Board can accept all nominees, and all nominees were consequently elected. We are pleased to welcome two new Trustees, Jocelyn Hoskin who has subsequently accepted the role of Treasurer, and Susan Waugh-Filippi.



At the meeting, three Trustees were thanked and farewelled. Alastair Bisley who has been on the Board for two years was one of the members of the hardworking Centenary committee. He was responsible for the very successful launch of the Centenary year.

The other two Trustees stepping down were Athol Swann and Jock Fleming. They are two of the original Trustees – in fact Jock was a main proponent for the establishment of this Community organisation and served as its first Chairman, and Athol has served in this capacity since late 2003. It is their vision and hard work that has enabled the Trust to be recognised by the City Council and wider community as a valued partner of Otari. They will be greatly missed from the Board. I am sure that they will continue to assist the Board with their knowledge for the various projects we undertake.

The Trust thanks Alastair, Athol and Jock for all the enthusiasm, expertise and time they have committed to Otari in the past years.

After the AGM there was a very interesting and informative discussion lead by a panel of scientists who had taken part in the March Bioblitz.

"Professor Phil Garnock-Jones said that the Bioblitz was a very enjoyable event for scientists and an unusual & valuable opportunity to work together on taxonomy and the ecology of a single location. Margaret Harper & Rodney Lewington both reported on the large numbers of species still to be found and identified in their areas, in addition to what they found during the Bioblitz. Rudi Schnitzler reported on the large number of as yet unidentified insects that were collected - now held at Victoria University. He suggested that if some funding were available there are senior students who could do the first level of sorting into orders. With more funding this sorting could be carried further to family, sub family, genus and morpho-species or species level.

Donations from members, or offers of help towards securing funding for this purpose, would be a great contribution to the on-going work of building up the scientific record for Otari."

I am privileged to have been elected to the chair of the Otari-Wilton's Bush Trust and hope the new Board can continue the great work done in the centenary year. I look forward to meeting as many members as possible and hearing suggestions and ideas for projects that the Trust can initiate or carry out in partnership with the Council Parks and Gardens staff.

It is an important time in the development of Otari-Wilton's Bush.

The new ten year management plan has been approved by the Council and is available at <u>www.wellington.govt.nz</u>. Your Board prepared a major submission to this plan and was consulted by Parks and Gardens management team.

One of the first steps in the plan is the preparation of a landscape plan which the Board intends to follow with nterest bearing in mind suggestions made already to the Council.

I look forward to seeing you all at this year's Open Day on August 11th for the annual plant sale and other activities.

Report to Otari-Wilton's Bush Trust May 2007

Hi everybody,



Planting season is here, and I have just come up from the Troup Picnic Lawn where volunteers have been planting along a small section of the streamside and in the areas that were affected by the pine removals and redevelopment works here last year. It won't be long before there is tree cover once more, and some of our grandchildren will be lucky enough to see tall podocarps one day – a very fitting replacement for the pines.

Also new at the Troup is the toilet, which is a welcome replacement for the old block. The new toilet will be up and running when electricity is connected, which should be in the next couple of months.

We have been winding down from the BioBlitz held in March. Once again, many thanks to all the Trust members who contributed to this very successful event, I hope you all got to come along and share in the discoveries. One of the highlights for the staff here was networking with the scientific community. Getting their opinions on what they found and what it might mean for Otari's management was invaluable.

Last month I visited Mt Annan Botanic Gardens in Sydney, a satellite garden of the Royal Sydney Botanic Gardens. It is very similar to Otari in many ways, with natural woodland areas, and Australian native plant collections spread over 416 hectares. I spent nearly six hours there and got a pretty good tour thanks to director Caz McCallum and other staff. The garden looked absolutely fantastic, and it was great to be able to draw many parallels with Otari while talking to them.

The annual Otari-Wilton's Bush Open Day is coming up on Saturday 11 August. There will be plenty to see and do this year. The plant sale will have some of New Zealand's finest for sale, walks and talks will be held both indoors and out and there will be displays by the Trust and other environmental groups from around Wellington.

At the recent AGM David Sole commented that Jock had been fitted with a GPS so that the

Project RAMBO

About the time you receive this newsletter, 56 DOC200 kill traps, which have recently been set throughout Otari-Wilton's Bush, will be claiming their first victims. A team of 30 volunteers are working in partnership with WCC and Greater Wellington to reduce the numbers of rats and stoats in the reserve.



The first step has been to monitor these predators by setting up 60 tracking tunnels. This was done at the end of May and beginning of June. Straight after the monitoring, the traps, which were put in place by volunteers in May, will be set, and checked regularly thereafter. Monitoring will be repeated in four months time to assess the effectiveness of trapping. If the Rodent and Mustalid Blitzing at Otari (RAMBO) is successful the breeding rates of hole nesting birds (ie, Morepork and Kingfisher) will rise. The natural regeneration of the forest should also improve, as rats are known to eat many seeds as well as insects and lizards.

In the long run, we also hope this programme will make it possible for species such as Bellbird and Kaka to begin breeding again at Otari-Wilton's Bush.

Glow worm walks

The walk on June 22 is part of the Wellington City Council's Matariki (Māori New Year) Celebrations.

Take a walk through the bush at night, down the Nature Trail to the Kaiwharawara stream. Have a look at tree ferns, rimus, epiphytes in profusion, ratas, crayfish – and glow worms. Imagine what it would be like living in a gelatinous tube and using a light shining out of your rear end to catch an exclusive diet of midges! The tour starts from the information centre, and you'll need good shoes, warm clothing, and a torch. All children must be accompanied by an adult. Glow worms guaranteed!

Walks & Talks - New Courses at Otari

The Cultivation of Native Plants

Otari-Wilton's Bush has two aspects - an extensive area of native forest, and a special botanic garden where many native plants from all over New Zealand are cultivated. Rewi Elliot, curator manager of Otari, will talk about the development of the cultivated areas at Otari. The talk will be illustrated with historical and recent photos. The Saturday walk will be around the cultivated areas highlighting species of special merit for the home garden. A tour of the nursery will be included. Wednesday 10 & Saturday 13 October

Introduction to our Native Ferns

New Zealand is notable for its abundance of ferns, almost 200 species, ranging from small and delicate filmy ferns to massive tree ferns. The talk will look at the place of ferns in New Zealand's landscape and culture, as well as describing the characteristics useful for identifying ferns. Leon Perrie is a Botanist from Te Papa. The Saturday workshop will involve hands-on identification, followed by a walk around Otari-Wilton's Bush to see living specimens of many of the species. Wednesday 21 & Saturday 24 November

What Bug is That?

What's that crawling up my leg? Find out about the unique and often secret life of the bugs, slugs, beetles and other creepy crawlies that live in New Zealand bush. Dave Burton lectures in Biology at Victoria University. The evening talk on Wednesday will be followed by an identification and bush walk the following Saturday.



What Native Plant is That?

All about New Zealand native plants. We will look mainly at the forests which are well represented around Wellington, but we will also consider other, particularly alpine communities. Includes 2 Wednesday evenings 7-9pm, a Saturday identification morning at Otari Information Centre, and Saturday trips to Kaitoke Regional Park, Waikanae Forest Reserves and Otari - Wiltons Bush. It starts on Wednesday 24 October \$60. (Leaflets are available from the Otari Information Centre.

Raukaua edgerleyi (syn. Pseudopanax edgerleyi)



This is a small tree related to Pseudopanax (five-finger). This drawing is of the juvenile form. When adult they form a small tree to about 5 metres. They can grow as an epiphyte, and the only one we know of in the bush at Otari is growing out of a tree fern at the top of the Blue Trail. The illustrated seedling has grown from seed collected from this tree. Raukaua edgerleyi can be seen growing in the Pseudopanax border at the lower end of the generic borders, and in the edge of the Wild Garden. The adult leaves are not dissected into leaflets, and the edges of leaves are entire, not toothed. It makes a very attractive plant, but it is not readily available.
