Saturday 15 September 2pm	Highlights of the Otari-Wilton's Bush collections Leader John Dawson Meet at the Otari Information Centre at 2 pm.
Sunday 23 September 2pm	Ferns are a conspicuous feature of New Zealand forests, ranging from small, delicate filmy ferns to massive tree ferns. Many grow on the forest floor, but others climb up tree trunks or perch on their branches. Come and see some of our ferns and learn about how they live their lives. <i>Leader Leon Perrie</i> . Meet at the Information Centre at 2 pm.
Sunday 28 October 2pm	Huntleigh Forest Park, Crofton Downs. Not actually part of Otari, but not far away. This secondary forest has been a reserve for about 50 years and is now dense and vigorous and well worth a close inspection. Meet at 2 pm at the Girl Guides Centre, which is at the end of a short road running from Silverstream Road down to the stream. <i>Leader Olaf John</i> .
Sunday 25 November 2pm	Time for another historical walk to look at dray roads, farm sites, etc., and to hear about both Maori and Pakeha involvement in Otari- Wilton's Bush and its vicinity. Since my last report the Trust Board and members have been busy with a number of activities related to our centenary year. I would like to thank all those who have helped with Open Day, the Bioblitz Display launch and the Centenary babes planting last weekend.

The Board has also been busy with submissions to various WCC plans which potentially affect Otari-Wilton's Bush. These include the draft biodiversity plan, changes to infill housing regulations, Tinakori Hill landscape upgrade and earth works regulations; thanks to all who provided input.

Project Kaiwharawhara (revegetation of the stream) is in good heart with over 30 people attending a recent meeting and the addition of a new group close to Otari-Wilton's Bush at Abermarle St Northland making good progress on one of the waterways running into the stream within Otari-Wilton's Bush.

The Bioblitz display is now on at the Museum of Wellington City and Sea and is also included in the program for the Heritage gardens spring festival run by the Heritage promotion council. See www.wellingtonheritagepromotions.org.nz. Programs are available at Otari-Wilton's Bush Information Centre

Report to Otari-Wilton's Bush Trust September 2007

Hi everyone,

Open day has come and gone with the usual throngs of buyers looking to add a little native flavour to their garden. Despite the dubious weather and a resultant loss of Eftpos connection all day, the day went reasonably well. It's always a pleasure to see the Cockayne Lawn full of people who are passionate about native plants. Those who headed for the skyline with Barbara Mitcalfe and Chris Horne returned with slightly damp jackets and big smiles. Thank you to all who were involved in the preparation and those who helped on the day. We are already in the throes of planning for next year's event.

The final celebration of the centenary year was on Saturday 25 August, with 19 large tree species planted for babies born during past year. Fine weather and enthusiastic families made for a great morning. These trees will form part of the mature canopy in the forest that will cover this valley in years to come. Also at the end of the centenary, a BioBlitz display has been set up at the Museum of City and Sea. This is some excellent, high profile promotion for Otari and those who participated in the event. Well done Phil for your work on this.

At Otari we are finishing up our revegetation planting for the year, with only a few smaller areas to go. Many of the collections will be attended to now before the spring flush of growth is upon us, and the weeds start sprouting madly!

The Troup picnic area is looking fantastic after its makeover during the past 12 months, and visitors this summer will be able to fully enjoy the new facilities. New seats have been installed in the shelter, and a new mapboard will be going in soon. The new toilets are due for their final inspection in the last week of August and will then be open to the public during daylight hours.

When you're next at Otari, keep an eye out for the Otari pamphlet and the Nature Trail pamphlet, which have both been updated recently. Updates include changes that have occurred at Otari since the pamphlets were last designed, and they now sport new red and green livery.

With days growing longer and temperatures growing warmer, I urge you all to take advantage and head off to Otari to escape the urban jungle, enjoy the sun, and connect with one of the best experiences Wellington has to offer.

Stellin Plaque Unveiled

Stellin Memorial Park Orangi-Kaupapa Road Northland

This ceremony held recently celebrated the involvement of an Wellington airman in World War Two and his act of gallantry in avoiding a French village before crashing. The village people still remember him to this day. The park land was donated by his family some 30 years ago and due to the efforts of a local historian John Bickerton a plaque has been finally erected in his honour.

His family were in attendance at the ceremony which was attended by 200 people including a number of trust representatives The mayor unveiled the plaque. We encourage members to view it on a nice day as the view is fantastic and to remember loved ones lost in wars around the globe.

It can be reached from the Ridgeline track on Tinakori Hill (upper Weld St entrance) or from the carpark on Orangi-Kaupapa Road.

Open Day 2007

This year Open Day was held some weeks earlier than usual to coincide with Conservation Week. An interesting programme was planned with walks and talks in addition to the Plant Sale and Trust refreshment stands

Alas the weather was horrendous but in spite of this events went ahead. People queued in the wind and rain to buy plants. People went on the guided walks and people enjoyed sampling the gourmet tramping food cooked by John Sawyer in his demonstration..

The barbecue did well making \$276. 90 (278.50 last year). The cake stall did well though less than last year - \$546.70 (606.50). The Vodaphone Eftpos system went down which meant people spent cash on plants rather than on food!! However we thought we did well in spite of the setbacks.

We are very grateful to those who supplied all the delicious food and also to those who came and helped on the day – thank you all very much.

Centenary Finale with the Centenary Babies

We didn't reach the target of 100 babies but on Saturday, 25 September, the Centenary Year was wound up in grand style with the parents of 16 babies planting trees in the Kaiwharawhara Valley in the revegetated area along the stream side of the south Picnic ground. The trees were all species that will become canopy trees. In years to come the children will be able to walk along the valley and see the miro, pukatea, hinau, kahikatea etc beginning to dominate the forest.

One tree had been planted earlier so a total of 17 was planted. Many thanks to Otari for providing the trees.

With over 100 entries on New Zealand's terrestrial environment it provides a wealth of information on our major plant groups, ecosystems and animals.

Another Recent Book

The *Atlas of Bird Distribution in New Zealand 1994 - 2004* by C.J.R. Robertson, P. Hyvonen, M.J. Fraser and C.R. Pickard, published by the Ornithological Society of New Zealand was launched in August.

This book has over 400 plates describing the distribution of birds in New Zealand, species by species, including seasonal distributions. It also

includes the coastal distributions (around the New Zealand mainland) of marine bird species. The analysis explores birds occurring in different

habitats (e.g.wetlands, alpine, forest) and by their threat status. The atlas replaces an earlier OSNZ publication, put out in 1985.

Walks & Talks - New Courses at Otari

Please note there has been a change of date for Rewi Elliot's course on Cultivation of Native Plants. It is now on Wednesday 3 and Saturday 6 October, (a week earlier than stated in the last newsletter).

Thes courses were inspired by John Dawson's speech at the launch of the Centennial Year, in particular his interest in increasing the use of Otari-Wilton's bush as a public education facility. Onslow College have been working with John to offer some new courses in October/ November. These courses will all be based at the Education Centre. If they prove successful we will hope to expand further in 2008.

The three following short courses all follow the same format of one Wednesday evening 7-9pm and the following Saturday morning from 10am. \$60 for all 3 courses; or \$30 each

The Cultivation of Native Plants

Rewi Elliot, curator manager of Otari, will talk about the development of the cultivated areas at Otari. The talk will be illustrated with historical and recent photos. The Saturday walk will be around the cultivated areas highlighting species of special merit for the home garden. A tour of the nursery will be included. Wednesday 3 & Saturday 6 October

Introduction to our Native Ferns

The talk will look at the place of ferns in New Zealand's landscape and culture, as well as describing the characteristics useful for identifying ferns. Leon Perrie is a Botanist from Te Papa. The Saturday workshop will involve hands-on identification, followed by a walk around Otari-Wilton's Bush to see living specimens of many of the species.

Wednesday 21 & Saturday 24 November

What Bug is That?

What's that crawling up my leg? Find out about the unique and often secret life of the bugs, slugs, beetles and other creepy crawlies that live in New Zealand bush. Dave Burton lectures in Biology at Victoria University. The evening talk on Wednesday will be followed by an identification and bush walk the following Saturday. Wednesday 28 November & Saturday 1 December

Also John Dawson's own course which has run successfully for a number of years. It is comments from participants in this course that have been helpful in suggesting new courses.

What Native Plant is That?

All about New Zealand native plants. We will look mainly at the forests which are well represented around Wellington, but we will also consider other, particularly alpine communities. Includes 2 Wednesday evenings 7-9pm, a Saturday identification morning at Otari Information Centre, and Saturday trips to Kaitoke Regional Park, Waikanae Forest Reserves and Otari - Wiltons Bush. It starts on Wednesday 24 October \$60. (Leaflets are available from the Otari Information Centre.



Parsonsia heterophylla

Akakiore, Kaihua, native jasmine

This is a climber which is very common in Wellington, and found throughtout the country and on some of the offshore islands. It can climb to 10 metres, and is generally found growing in coastal and lowland forests, especially around the margins. The juvenile form has very long narrow leaves, the adult shorter and wider. It has creamy scented flowers in panicles in spring, very prolific, followed by long slender pods with wind borne seeds. In cultivation it is easy to grow and has probably turned up in your garden of its own accord. It likes a cool root run, and climbs up into the sun. A very good plant to grow through a hedge.
