Chairman's Message

Hi Everyone

We are now in to a warmer time of the year and potentially lots more visitors to Otari-Wilton's Bush. The cruise ship season has started and visitors continue to be impressed with the range of plants one even calling the juvenile pseudopanax species an upside down tree! I assured her that later on in life it righted itself to a more treelike specimen.

The results of the visitor survey done last March were very encouraging.

The points to note:

- A spread of types and ages , family groups, alone, with friends etc
- Time spent 86% up to 2 hours
- High number of return visits 68%
- About 20% visiting from out of town or overseas
- Mean overall satisfaction of 6.7/7.0, an excellent score

Further benchmark information against all gardens surveyed should be available early next year, 2010.

We can be pleased but not complacent about these results and I know you will all do your bit to keep the good work going. Don't be shy to ask people if they want help; they are normally happy to get assistance. Please note the general rock garden is now the Brockie rock garden after a small ceremony last week at the seat installation.

Weekend hosts now have a new stock of the Nature Guide to the New Zealand Forest signed by the author, our chief guide Dr John Dawson. Please show it to people who may be interested in purchasing a copy. I know several hosts have also given them as Xmas presents; the Rob Lucas photos show many Otari-Wilton's Bush examples.

We will now also have an Otari-Wilton's Bush heritage map and booklet available that has been in production for some time. This has been produced in conjunction with the Wellington Botanical Society and funded partly by a grant from the Lotteries Board.

Lastly I would like to say a big thanks to Tim O'Leary, one of the long serving Otari-Wilton's Bush staff members who left this month. On behalf of all volunteers and trust members we gave him an appropriate gift at a recent farewell. Have a safe and happy summer.

Otari Report

Kia ora koutou

We have certainly had a busy last few months here at Otari. It was sad to see long time staff member Tim O'Leary leave last month after working here for the past 12 years. Tim made a great contribution to Otari while here. We hope to appoint someone into this position soon.



The barbecues at the Troup lawn have been in the spotlight recently after a child stood on the hotplate and burnt her feet. I turned the barbecues off for several weeks while we organised some warning signage to alert people that they may be hot. Warning signage is now installed adjacent to the hotplates and the barbecues are available for use.

We now have a plaque commemorating Walter Brockie on a seat next to the pond in the rock garden. Previously we had nothing in memorial of Brockie who built the rock garden when he was curator here from 1947 - 1962. It's great to now have some recognition of his important contribution.

Don't be alarmed when gaping holes appear in the rock garden for a period. Dave hopes to be changing some of the soil in the rock garden over the early summer period. Once the soil has been renewed we will be replanting with plants we have propagated from the rock garden over the past year.

In December and January we have a contractor coming in to install some steps on the Red Trail and a fence on the Waterfall Track. This work will make short sections of both tracks a little easier and safer to negotiate.

I will miss some of our summer this year. I am travelling to India from the end of November to mid January. I hope to visit several forest parks and botanic gardens in Gujarat and Rajasthan while there.

Path and other location names used in the Otari Open-Air Native Plant museum 1926- 1965:

This is a map and a booklet that reflects many hours of dedicated research by Rodney Lewington. The map displays all the historic paths etc as well as the current. It is an historic record which has been brought to life through his painstaking voluntary work and is now preserved for the future.

In a 1932 report Cockayne noted the need for easy reference to paths and locations: "It has been decided that such names, with a few exceptions, shall be those of the botanists who, by their researches, have brought about the present knowledge of the flora and vegetation of New Zealand so that the history of our botany from the first voyage of Captain Cook up to the present time may be chronicled in the Museum." The booklet names all the different paths and locations with a brief biography of the person commemorated. This interesting and informative book and map is now available for \$30.

This book was launched recently at the Otari Education Centre. Unfortunately too late for a review in this newsletter - look for it in the next one. Copies are available from Margaret Crimp 475 3263.

Saturday volunteers

A steady group of volunteers has turned out on the first Saturday of each month to undertake plant care in Otari. Our efforts during the year have been mainly concentrated on the Kaiwharawhara Valley, clearing weeds from around the stream banks but also broom and gorse up the sides of the valley. In August and September we moved out of the valley to clear broom and gorse from the triangle on the corner of Wilton Road and Churchill Drive which had been planted up 4 years ago. In July the group planted several hundred trees on the tip face below Ian Galloway Park to supplement trees planted there last year and replace those that had not survived in not particularly great soil.



As an extra, members of the group participated in a Council planting in August organised by Otari staff at Huntleigh Park in Ngaio as our contribution to the 350 campaign on Climate Change where we planted 350 trees (picture attached).

Thanks to Wayne, Terry, Ron, Lynley, Owen, Leo, Geoff, Laurel, Martha and Viv for turning out regularly and to the Otari staff who provide tools and Vigilant each month.

We won't be working in January but from February onwards we'll be out there from 9am for around 2 hours work followed by a cup of tea, home baking and a chat. Please feel free to join us, there's lots of work to do. Meet at the Information Centre at 9am on the first Saturday of the month.



Courses at Otari

Brachyglottis turneri

This species is a naturally uncommon species with a restricted distribution. It is found only on a small area of northeast Taranaki, where it grows on wet mudstone cliffs. While it is easy to propagate, it is tricky to keep going in a garden. At Otari it is growing in the Brockie Rock Garden, in the small waterfall above the pond. It has yellow flowers and reddish stems, and likes its feet wet.
